Dear Members,

With the passing of Ruth Bader Ginsburg, we're left with heavy hearts but awestruck by her courage, strength of character and tenacity. That one person, just one person, could reach such immeasurable heights. Changing the way law sees gender and interprets true equity is NO LITTLE TASK!

#### **Highlights of the September Get Out the Vote Program**

**Vote by Mail fraud is a myth.** This is a tactic to convince voters not to vote during a pandemic. We learned each ballot has a unique number/barcode that identifies your ballot as your vote. You sign the ballot return envelope and this is verified by election judges when your ballot is received (just like voting at the polls).

If you requested a Vote by Mail ballot and have not received it by Oct. 10, call the county election office to resolve the problem or request another ballot. When you mail your ballot, take it inside the post office and give it to a clerk to see that it is postmarked.

If you are planning to return your ballot by US postal service, mail it as early as possible or by Oct. 20. The alternative is to drop your ballot (in the signed envelope) in a secure ballot collection box.

If you don't trust the US Post Office to deliver your ballot, you can deliver your ballot to a secure ballot collection box at the following locations beginning Oct. 19.

Some discussion points of getting out the vote 2020 were:

- the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of women getting the vote is a historic time to get high voter turnout and honor our fore-mothers. If they could rally support for an amendment in 1919-20, we can vote in 2020 in spite of a pandemic.
- get voters' attention by a neighborhood bike parade; "Vote" signs in the window, on your car, or yard signs; social media posts; chat vote reminders during Zoom meetings; or wear a VOTE message t-shirt on daily walks or

- **share info that you learned about voting** in 2020 with at least 5-10 friends in your personal network and ask them each to share with at least 5-10 more friends (use outdoor coffees, phone, email, letter or postcard). Also, use social media to share what you learned.

- Democracy is not a spectator sport, it requires active citizens to survive!
