Important - AAUW Election & Bylaws Voting: Apr. 3 - May 14

The proposed change to the Bylaws would open up AAUW membership to anyone who supports our mission of equity for women and girls. There are many successful and capable women who do not have a degree (40% of women). This would allow us to recruit anyone without worrying if they have a degree. This amendment was proposed by a grassroots member group, and the AAUW national board and our AAUW IL board has voted to support it. I would ask you to support this change as well.

The branch co-sponsored this program with the Des Plaines Library, a live portrayal of Elizabeth Packard - The Woman They Could Not Silence (book by Kate Moore.)

What would you do if your spouse committed you to an Insane Asylum for no other reason than he disliked your opinions? What would you do if you learned that the law allowed that to happen, and you had no legal recourse? What would you do if you wanted to speak out, prove your sanity, and change the world you live in?

Elizabeth Packard was committed to the Illinois State Hospital in 1860 and was kept under lock and key for three years, all the while protesting her sanity. While her husband insisted to everyone that she was insane, Elizabeth was able to obtain her release. Realizing that current law allowed married women to be placed in asylums by their husbands, Elizabeth started a campaign to change that unjust law. Through her perseverance, her voice was heard and the laws were changed.

This timely living history portrayal by Laura F. Keyes shows how, throughout history and even up to the present day, women's voices are silenced and marginalized when they dare to express opinions contrary to those of the men in power.

Public Policy:

The Illinois legislature is considering several bills related to gun violence protection and protection of families of victims of gun violence. For safety of women and children, AAUW supports Karina's bill HB 4469/SB 2633. When a victim, like Karina, is granted an order of protection that includes what's known as the "firearm remedy" — a court order that temporarily strips someone of their right to own a gun — the proposal (House Bill 4469 / Senate Bill 2633) would require a court to issue a search warrant that would enable law enforcement to seize the alleged abuser's firearms, and give a judge the ability to require police to execute the warrant within 96 hours. This legislation also adds dating partners and ex-dating partners to the list of petitioners in the firearm restraining orders act. Send a message to your Illinois rep and senator to support HB 4469/SB 2633.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Supreme Court is considering reducing our rights/protections on the life-saving ghost guns rule, protection of victims of domestic abuse by gun owners and the validity of assault weapon bans.

This coming August we will be talking to neighbors about the importance of voting in the November election. Having congressional representatives who support complete healthcare rights for women is essential to combat the current war on women's rights. Whether it is the right to use family planning, or use IVF to have a family; women deserve bodily autonomy to make personal health decisions.
